Health and Safety

In school, we practise a range of drills over the course of the year. Each term, we have a fire drill (which the children are very familiar with) and sometimes practise a lockdown drill. At times, the children might not know they are doing this. For example, a lockdown drill for outdoor chemical smells might just result in the children having to stay inside and all doors and windows being shut but normal learning carrying on. An intruder lockdown drill might result in the children hiding under tables in classrooms and remaining quiet. Most often, this would be practised as a game so that children are not worried or concerned. If your child comes home and tells you that they have been doing something like this, please do not be concerned. It is part of the normal health and safety routines that are followed by NCLT.

Attendance

Congratulations to all **58 children** who received bronze wristbands for 100% attendance in the autumn term. These children will now work towards their silver band. Other children are able to achieve a bronze wrist band this term by being at school every day. Our attendance and punctuality winner was Niamh who will soon be going for a treat to Smyths and McDonalds with a friend who also achieved 100%. Our most improved attendance winner (from the Autumn1 to Autumn 2) was Bruce. Well done!

This week, the Local Authority Attendance Officer has been in school supporting with improving attendance and to advise us of new Rotherham guidance. In line with other local schools, where attendance falls below 92%, medical evidence will need to be provided for any further absences for them to be considered authorised. Appropriate evidence could be prescriptions, GP letters, appointment cards etc. Any absence (below 92%) where there is no medical evidence, will be recorded as unauthorised.

Teacher Strikes

As you may have heard, the NEU union plan to hold strike action on 1st February. This does affect some of our staff. Other staff are part of a different union and so will not be striking.

Once we have a clear picture about which classes may be affected, we will let you know so that you can plan accordingly. As soon as we possibly can, we will let you know as we appreciate that you may need to make alternative arrangements for your children.
