

Year Four Spring Term Two

 English This half term we will be using Talk for Writing to learn a journey tale. An adaptation of 'The Hobbit' will be used for this. We will use the dialogue and action toolkits to innovate and create an independent piece of writing. Our non-fiction focus text will be 'Should we still have zoos?' and this will lead into the children writing their own discussion text. We will be Consolidating how to punctuate direct speech Tagging on what a character is doing while speaking using a stage direction Using a variety of progressive -ing openers Planning Editing and evaluating Writing paragraphs to interest the reader Creating a serious of points in favour and against a connected paragraph Creating a reasoned conclusion which can be justified by the arguments. 	Mathematics We will begin the half term by continuing with our learning on length and perimeter. Children will convert between different units of measure and calculate the perimeter of a rectilinear figure. We will then be recognising and using fractions as numbers: unit fractions and non-unit fractions with small denominators, using diagrams, equivalent fractions with small denominators and comparing and ordering unit fractions, and fractions with the same denominators. We will also be using diagrams, families of common equivalent fractions to calculate quantities, and fractions to divide quantities. Our next unit will be on decimals. In this unit we will learn how recognise and write decimal equivalents of any number of tenths or hundredths and we will find the effect of dividing a one- or two-digit number by 10 and 100, identifying the value of the digits in the answer as ones, tenths and hundredths. <u>Vocabulary</u> Tenths, hundredths, equivalent, simplify, numerator, denominator, fraction, mixed number, improper fractions, simplest fractions, numerator, denominator, tens, ones, decimal point, tenths, hundredths, greater than, equivalent, less than, decimal, centimetre, millimetre.
ScienceOur Science unit is called 'Living things and their Habitats'. The children will be working scientifically to recognise that living things can be grouped in a variety of ways, to explore and use classification keys and recognise that environments can change and the impact this has on living things.Key Vocabulary Classification, classification keys, environment, habitat, human impact, positive, negative, migrate, hibernate.Art Our art unit is skills based this half term and focuses on pencil sketching.
